An update on Mental Health Policy: there has been for some time a policy to move patients out of secondary care (hospitals) where possible into primary care where the GP will be responsible for overseeing their care. Patients have been encouraged to be more involved in the decisions with regard to their care. It has been recognized that an equal partnership between professionals and the public is crucial to improving services. There have been several workshops with patients stating what they feel is important in the development of the services One priority is the enhancing of the quality of life for people with long-term mental health problems to help them become more independent where there are often environmental barriers and sometimes financial ones.

For anyone affected by mental illness or wanting to improve their mental health, the web-site Go4MentalHealth Westminster may be of help.

I wish I had some encouraging news about the NHS but we seem to have had to endure cut-back after cut-back. However we are fortunate that, in spite of that, MHC is valiant in endeavouring to continue to give patients the highest quality service.

## Your free Influenza ('flu) Vaccination-



The 'flu is a highly infectious illness that spreads rapidly through the coughs and sneezes of people who are carrying the virus. It remains a major cause of illness especially in the elderly and those with chronic diseases. Immunisation has shown to reduce the risk of contracting the flu and the possible complications of such as pneumonia. As part of the National Flu programme the vaccine is offered free to a number of groups. These include those aged 65 and over, pregnant women, children aged two to four, carers and those with chronic diseases such as diabetes, lung, heart, liver or neurological disease and immunosuppressed patients. If you are entitled to a free vaccine you will receive an invitation letter or Text from the Practice.

If you don't want to have a flu jab or have your jab privately, at your pharmacy or elsewhere please let us know as we have a duty to continue to offer this service throughout the flu season and is very resource heavy.

Changes to sharps disposal- Due to NHS contract changes the surgery and local pharmacies can no longer accept returned medicines or sharps bins which you may use at home. We appreciate that this may be difficult for you, however we no longer have access to safe disposal facilities. Hazardous Household Waste Collection Service (see above).

### WHAT IS THE INTEGRATED CLINICAL APPRENTICESHIP?

The Integrated Clinical Apprenticeship is a new project involving Imperial College School of Medicine's Year 5 students, working in pairs in the community to enable them to learn from patients and experienced GPs and help them become more well-rounded Doctors.

Each pair of students will develop their own "Caseload" of patients and follow their healthcare for a full year. If you agree to see our students, they will be available for appointments at your GP surgery on a Thursday morning. You will still be able to see your own GP as required and when a student is seeing you for a new problem, you will always be reviewed by a GP after seeing the students. Throughout the year, if you have any other hospital

appointments, we would encourage you to share these dates with your students so that they may come with you. You are free at any time during the year to stop participating, or to refuse students attending certain appointments and parts of your care.

## Your patient record

In order to support your care, NHS healthcare professionals maintain records about you. At our surgery we take great care to ensure your information is kept securely and used appropriately. Our staff are fully trained to understand their legal and professional obligations to protect your information. Our NHS IT system we use can be enabled to allow other health professionals and their teams to support the provision of your care by 'sharing-out' your medical records. This is done centrally on our system and unless a patient informs us that they wish their notes not to be shared their medical records will be shared as described below. At the moment we have NO information automatically being shared out-However we have been asked to share out all patients medical records automatically and we have been informed that;

You have the choice not to share- You can ask for all or some of your information not to be shared outside of the practice. If you decide not to share at all this will not affect your entitlement to care. However, it may result in the delivery of your care being less efficient as clinicians will not see your full medical history. If you have any concerns about how your information is shared or held, please contact reception or our practice website.

Access to your health information- You have a right under the Data Protection Act 1998 to access or view information the practice holds about you, and to have it amended or removed should it be inaccurate. Please ask at reception for details.

Who can see your information with your permission? In order to provide you with health care services, trained clinicians and their support teams in the following organisations will be able to see your health care records (this information may change if new services are commissioned by the CCG):
